SUBJECT: PETITION FOR AMENDMENTS TO THE DALLAS CITY CHARTER ON BEHALF OF THE DALLAS HERO INITIATIVE

On June 18, 2024, pursuant to Sec. 9.004(a) of the Texas Local Government Code, our office received three separate petitions to:

- 1) AMEND THE DALLAS CITY CHARTER TO PRIORITIZE AN APPROPRIATION OF YEAR OVER YEAR CITY REVENUE INCREASES FOR SPECIFIC PUBLIC SAFETY OBJECTIVES INCLUDING FUNDING THE DALLAS POLICE AND FIRE PENSION SYSTEM, INCREASING THE NUMBER OF SWORN POLICE OFFICERS, AND ENSURING THEIR PAY IS COMPETITIVE;
- 2) AMEND THE DALLAS CITY CHARTER TO REQUIRE AN ANNUAL COMMUNITY SURVEY OF SERVICES OF THE CITY, AND BASED UPON THE RESULTS OF SUCH SURVEY, PROVIDE CONSEQUENCES FOR THE CITY MANAGER, INCLUDING AWARDING PERFORMANCE COMPENSATION OR TERMINATION;
- 3) ALLOW RESIDENTS TO FORCE THE CITY OF DALLAS TO FOLLOW ITS OWN ORDINANCES, ITS OWN CHARTER AND TEXAS STATE LAW

Petition 1 had a total of <u>8 boxes</u> containing approximately <u>7,489 petition pages (59,730</u> submitted signatures);

Petition 2 had a total of <u>8 boxes</u> containing approximately <u>6,880 petition pages (54,126 submitted signatures)</u>; and

Petition 3 had a total of <u>8 boxes</u> containing approximately <u>7,047 petition pages(55,517 submitted signatures)</u>.

Texas Local Government Code, Sec. 9.004(a) and (b), states in part, "....The governing body shall submit a proposed charter amendment to the voters for their approval at an election if the submission is supported by a petition signed by a number of qualified voters of the municipality equal to at least five percent of the number of qualified voters of the municipality or 20,000, whichever number is the smaller." ...(b) The ordinance ordering the election shall provide for the election to be held on the first authorized uniform election date prescribed by the Election Code or on the earlier of the date of the next municipal general election or presidential general election. The election date must allow sufficient time to comply with other requirements of law and must occur on or after the 30th day after the date the ordinance is adopted.

However, I made the decision to use the statistical sample method for verifying signature on all three separate petitions as allowed by the Texas Election Code (TEC). TEC, Section 277.003 states, in part, "...If a petition contains more than 1,000 signatures, the city secretary or other authority responsible for verifying the signatures may use any reasonable statistical

sampling method in determining whether the petition contains the required number of valid signatures, except that the sample may not be less than 25 percent of the total number of signatures appearing on the petition or 1,000, whichever is greater..."

With the consultant (Weaver) and I having examined the petition signatures, I have found the three petitions to contain sufficient signatures to qualify as valid. Therefore, I am submitting the attached petition analysis report, with certificate of sufficiency, for each petition to the City Council for appropriate action on August 14, 2024.

RE: Petition Signature Verification: Petition for Increased Public Safety.

Dear Ms. Johnson:

Weaver has been retained by the City Secretary's Office and the Office of the City Auditor of the City of Dallas in connection with the above referenced matter. As part of our work, Weaver has been asked to support the use of statistical sampling to determine the validity of citizen petitions for a voter referendum in accordance with Texas Election Code Section 277.003 and Section 141.069 by 1) recommending and designing a random sampling procedure, and 2) extrapolating the results of the sample to the entire population to quantify the number of valid signatures obtained for the aforementioned petition.

SUMMARY OF RESULTS

Based on the results of the sample selection, validation and sample extrapolation we determined the lower bound and upper bound of total valid signatures for the Increased Public Safety Petition to be 24,820 and 25,581 respectively.¹

Our results indicate, with 95% confidence, that the interval between the lower bound of valid signatures and the upper bound of signatures contains the true value of valid signatures. These results indicate that **Increased Public Safety Petition meets the minimum requirement** of 20,000 signatures.²

Our conclusions are based on information and methodologies of a type reasonably relied upon by experts in the field and in accordance with Texas Election Code. Weaver's sampling procedures is based on the data contained in the Client's signatures spreadsheet. If any additional information becomes available, we may update or supplement this report accordingly.

DATA AND STRATIFICATION

Weaver was provided with a summary excel file containing all line items for each petition and its respective contents (i.e. signature, blank lines, strikethrough, fatal error, etc.). The individual who obtained the petition signatures ("Petition Circulator") was also included.

Based upon our review of the structure of the signature data and in discussions with the City Secretary's Office and the Office of the City Auditor, we recommended that the sample frame be stratified by Petition Circulator.³ The main objective of stratification is to define the strata in a way that the sample is representative of the universe of signatures while optimizing the sample size.

Based Texas Election Code Section 277.003, we selected 25% of each stratum within the total population of signatures using Petition Circulator as the stratification criteria.⁴ In addition, to ensure sufficient sampling of each stratum, we adjusted the minimum sample sizes for each stratum to at least one claim if a calculated stratum size generated a smaller sample size and rounded up if a calculation resulted in a partial claim.

We proposed a sample of 15,099 signatures, or approximately 25.28% of the total 59,730 signatures, across the 432 strata.

Minimal variances occurred in the sample verification process, which resulted in 15,491 sampled signatures, or approximately 25.95% of the 59,698 signatures.

After designing the sample size for each stratum, the City of Dallas Auditors Office

selected the claims to be sampled using software independently of Weaver.

EXTRAPOLATION

The final step in the sampling process is the extrapolation of the sample results to all signatures in each stratum. The Client determined the validity of each signature in the sample.

Based on a 95% confidence level, as required by Texas Election Code Section 141.069, we calculated a lower bound and upper bound of valid signatures.⁵ The unbiased estimator for the population mean is 25,200.

These results were obtained using the following unbiased estimator for the population mean:

And the following estimator for the 95% interval:

- L is the number of strata
- N_j is the number of items within strata j
- \hat{p}_i is the proportion of valid signatures within strata j
- n_j is the number of samples in strata j

PROPOSED DALLAS CITY CHARTER AMENDMENT

That the Dallas City Charter is hereby amended by adding Sec. 15 to Chapter XI. "Priority of Excess Revenue" as follows:

- A. If at any time the total actual, accruing or estimated annual revenue of the City exceeds the total actual annual revenue of the prior fiscal year, the City Council shall appropriate no less than 50% of such excess amount, in compliance with Section 1 of Chapter XI of this Charter, to fund the Dallas Police and Fire Pension System Combined Plan, in the amount directed by the State Pension Review Board and/or the City Council, whichever is higher. Any monies remaining shall be appropriated to the Public Safety Objectives described below in Section B.
- B. Public Safety Objectives:
 - 1. The starting combined salary and non-pension benefits, excluding sign-on bonuses, of the police officers of the Dallas Police Department are within the top five of all city police departments (as compared to the starting combined salary and non-pension benefits) in Dallas, Collin, Tarrant, Denton, and Rockwall counties with a population over 50,000, on a per officer basis; and
 - 2. The total number of full-time sworn police officers of the police department of the City of Dallas is increased to at least 4,000 and the ratio established of 4,000 officers to Dallas city residents as of the date of the passage of this Charter Amendment is maintained or increased going forward.
 - a. <u>Any monies appropriated to this Public Safety Objective but not spent within the fiscal year shall</u> <u>be transferred to a sinking fund to fund this Public Safety Objective in the subsequent fiscal year.</u>
- C. Any monies remaining after all Public Safety Objectives defined in this Section have been met may be reappropriated by the City Council.
- D. The City, on an annual basis, shall hire a third-party firm to conduct a survey to calculate the starting combined salary and non-pension benefits, excluding sign-on bonuses, of the full-time police officers of all cities in Dallas, Collin, Tarrant, Denton, and Rockwall counties with a population over 50,000, on a per officer basis, and report the findings to the City Council. The third-party firm will be required to certify in writing to the City that it used its best efforts to include responses from each city in Dallas, Collin, Tarrant, Denton, and Rockwall counties in the annual survey, and the failure or unwillingness of any city to participate in the survey shall have no impact on either (1) the City's and the third-party firm's obligations to complete and deliver the survey required by this Section on an annual basis or (2) the City's obligations under this Chapter.
- E. <u>As used in this Section, "revenue" shall mean all revenue collected by the City that's use is not restricted to a limited purpose under State or Federal law, including, but not limited to ad valorem property tax, sales tax, beverage taxes, asset forfeiture funds, bingo fees, cemetery taxes, impact fees, interlocal agreements, internet payment and access fees, investments, court fees, open records fees, municipal development corporation sales taxes, municipal development district taxes, pro rata fees, public improvement district assessments, right-of-way fees, special improvement district fund taxes, street assessments, time warrants, user fees, venue taxes, donations, coin-operated machine taxes, drainage fees, hotel taxes, parking fees, franchise fees, enterprise funds, charges for services, admission fees, fines and forfeitures, operating transfers from municipally controlled entities, municipal enterprises, municipally owned utilities, municipally controlled districts, licenses and permits, and interest, but shall not include any debt proceeds taken on by the City, or any grants, appropriations or other revenue received from other governmental or non-profit entities (that weren't directly or indirectly initially provided to such other governmental or non-profit entities by the City).</u>
- F. If any section, paragraph, clause, or provision of this Section is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of that section, paragraph, clause, or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Section, and to this end, the provisions of this Section are declared to be severable. This Section shall supersede the Dallas City Code to the extent there are any conflicts.

These results indicate that **City Leader Accountability Petition meets the minimum requirement** of 20,000 signatures.²

After designing the sample size for each stratum, the City of Dallas Auditors Office

PROPOSED DALLAS CITY CHARTER AMENDMENT

That the Dallas City Charter is hereby amended by adding Sec. 3 of Chapter VI. "Annual Community Survey and City Manager Performance Compensation" as follows:

SEC. 3. Annual Community Survey and City Manager Performance Compensation.

- A. <u>The City Council shall provide the City Manager an opportunity to receive potential "performance compensation" of up to 100% of the City Manager's annual base salary for the preceding fiscal year, and which shall be paid based upon the results of an annual survey of residents described in this Section. Such "performance compensation" shall be included in the City Budget and funded each fiscal year as part of the City Manager's overall compensation, but performance compensation funds will be separate and distinct from the City Manager's salary and any other compensation included in the City Manager's employment agreement.</u>
- B. The City Council shall annually conduct a community survey to be completed and published between January 1 and March <u>15.</u>
 - 1. The annual community survey shall minimally contain the same questions asked and utilize the same methodology used in the "City of Dallas 2023 Community Survey" performed by the ETC Institute.
 - 2. A minimum of 1,400 completed surveys should be returned with at least 100 from every City Council district.
 - 3. The following question shall be included in the annual community survey, "Please indicate the extent to which you think each of the following are an issue in the City of Dallas by circling the corresponding number below, where a rating of 4 is "Not a Problem," a rating of 3 is "a Minor Problem," a rating of 2 is "a Moderate Problem." a rating of 1 is "a Major Problem" and a rating of "Don't Know."
 - a. The issues surveyed shall be:
 - i. <u>Crime</u>
 - ii. <u>Homelessness</u>
 - iii. <u>Litter</u>
 - iv. Aggressive Solicitation / Panhandling
 - v. Infrastructure / Streets
 - b. after each of the above issues there will be the opportunity to mark "4 Not a Problem," "3 Minor Problem," "2 Moderate Problem," "1 Major Problem," or "Don't Know."
 - 4. Additional questions may be included in the annual community survey, as long as the entity conducting the survey, in its reasonable belief, indicates that the additional questions will not affect the answers to the questions required by this Section and provides written certification of such reasonable belief to the City Council.
 - 5. <u>The entity conducting the survey shall conduct itself with complete impartiality to the outcome and shall provide</u> written certification thereof to the City Council.
 - 6. <u>Upon conclusion of the annual survey, the entity conducting the survey shall provide written certification to the City Council that, to their knowledge, no one has attempted to influence the conduct or outcome of the survey, or if such knowledge exists shall disclose the name and nature of the influence.</u>
 - The use of "push polling" language or techniques, or any other method that attempts to steer or influence responses, may not be employed. The entity conducting the survey shall provide written certification to the City Council that no such "push pulling" language or techniques were employed in the annual survey.
- C. If the City Manager has been on the job for at least 18 months as of January 1 of the current year, then based upon the published results of the survey in B(3) above:
 - 1. If on all five issues no more than 30% of all responses are "Moderate Problem" or "Major Problem," then the City Manager will be paid 100% of the performance compensation.
 - 2. If on four of the five issues no more than 30% of all responses are "Moderate Problem" or "Major Problem," then the City Manager will be paid 50% of the performance compensation.
 - 3. If on three of the five issues no more than 30% of all responses are "Moderate Problem" or "Major Problem," then the City Manager will not be paid the performance compensation.
 - 4. If on two or fewer issues no more than 30% of all responses are "Moderate Problem" or "Major Problem," then the City Manager will be terminated within 30 days by the City Council and shall be ineligible for reappointment as City Manager for a period of ten years.
- D. Dear Ms. Johnson:

Weaver has been retained by the City Secretary's Office and the Office of the City Auditor of the City of Dallas in connection with the above referenced matter. As part of our work, Weaver has been asked to support the use of statistical sampling to determine the validity of citizen petitions for a voter referendum in accordance with Texas Election Code Section 277.003 and Section 141.069 by 1) recommending and designing a random sampling procedure, and 2) extrapolating the results of the sample to the entire population to quantify the number of valid signatures obtained for the aforementioned petition.

SUMMARY OF RESULTS

Based on the results of the sample selection, validation and sample extrapolation we determined the lower bound and upper bound of total valid signatures for the Citizen Enforcement Petition to be 22,997 and 23,731 respectively.¹

Our results indicate, with 95% confidence, that the interval between the lower bound of valid signatures and the upper bound of signatures contains the true value of valid signatures. These results indicate that **Citizen Enforcement Petition meets the minimum requirement** of 20,000 signatures.²

¹ The Citizen Enforcement Petition represents a petition to allow residents to force the city of Dallas to follow its own ordinances, its own charter and Texas state law.

Our conclusions are based on information and methodologies of a type reasonably relied upon by experts in the field and in accordance with Texas Election Code. Weaver's sampling procedures is based on the data contained in the Client's signatures spreadsheet. If any additional information becomes available, we may update or supplement this report accordingly.

DATA AND STRATIFICATION

Weaver was provided with a summary excel file containing all line items for each petition and its respective contents (i.e. signature, blank lines, strikethrough, fatal error, etc.). The individual who obtained the petition signatures ("Petition Circulator") was also included.

Based upon our review of the structure of the signature data and in discussions with the City Secretary's Office and the Office of the City Auditor, we recommended that the sample frame be stratified by Petition Circulator.³ The main objective of stratification is to define the strata in a way that the sample is representative of the universe of signatures while optimizing the sample size.

Based Texas Election Code Section 277.003, we selected 25% of each stratum within the total population of signatures using Petition Circulator as the stratification criteria.⁴ In addition, to ensure sufficient sampling of each stratum, we adjusted the minimum sample sizes for each stratum to at least one claim if a calculated stratum size generated a smaller sample size and rounded up if a calculation resulted in a partial claim.

We proposed a sample of 14,037 signatures, or approximately 25.28% of the total 55,517 signatures, across the 417 strata.

Minimal variances occurred in the sample verification process, which resulted in 14,409 sampled signatures, or approximately 25.97% of the 55,490 signatures.

After designing the sample size for each stratum, the City of Dallas Auditors Office selected the claims to be sampled using software independently of Weaver.

⁴Texas Election Code Section 277.003 states: "If a petition contains more than 1,000 signatures, the city secretary or other authority responsible for verifying the signatures **may use any reasonable statistical sampling method** in determining whether the petition contains the required number of valid signatures, except that **the sample may not be less than 25 percent of the total number of signatures appearing on the petition or 1,000**, whichever is greater."

EXTRAPOLATION

The final step in the sampling process is the extrapolation of the sample results to all signatures in each stratum. The Client determined the validity of each signature in the sample.

Based on a 95% confidence level, as required by Texas Election Code Section 141.069, we calculated a lower bound and upper bound of valid signatures.⁵ The unbiased estimator for the population mean is 23,364.

These results were obtained using the following unbiased estimator for the population mean:

And the following estimator for the 95% interval:

PROPOSED DALLAS CITY CHARTER AMENDMENT

That the Dallas City Charter is hereby amended by adding Chapter XXV. "CITIZEN ENFORCEMENT" as follows:

SEC 1. RESIDENT ENFORCEMENT.

Any resident of Dallas has standing and may bring an action against the City of Dallas to require the City to comply with any of the provisions of this City Charter, any City ordinance or any law of the State of Texas.

- A. <u>A claimant is entitled to recover in an action brought under this Chapter:</u>
 - 1. declaratory and injunctive relief against the City; and
 - 2. <u>costs and reasonable attorney's fees, if the court orders injunctive or declaratory relief [See Texas Citizens</u> Participation Act and Uniform Declaratory Judgements Act].
- B. The City's governmental immunity to suit and from liability is waived to the extent of liability created by the Charter, City Ordinance and/or Texas state law.
- C. <u>Claimants shall notify the City of their claim not later than sixty days before the date such claimant files an</u> action under this Chapter. The notice must reasonably describe the charter provision, ordinance, or state law that the Claimant believes has been or may be violated.
- D. <u>"resident" shall mean any person who resides in the City of Dallas, and any firm. corporation, limited liability</u> <u>company, joint venture, trust, estate, nonprofit, or association which is physically located in or otherwise</u> <u>conducts business in the City of Dallas.</u>
- E. If any section, paragraph, clause, or provision of this Section is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of that section, paragraph, clause, or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Section, and to this end, the provisions of this Section are declared to be severable.
